

# Bangladesh's February 12, 2026 Election:

## A Staged Spectacle Under Yunus's Watch

**60% on Paper, 15% in the Streets:**



A nation of 170 million. A mandate questioned.

The world was told that February 12, 2026, would be the day Bangladesh finally breathed the air of "true democracy." After eighteen months of an unelected interim administration led by Nobel laureate Muhammad Yunus, the international community was promised a transition back to constitutional order. In constituencies like Rajshahi-4, reports have surfaced of turnout figures exceeding 200%, a statistical miracle that only occurs when the results are written before the first ballot is cast.

## The Yunus PR Machine vs. Reality

Muhammad Yunus has long been a darling of the West, and he is now weaponizing that reputation to gaslight the international community. His administration is engaged in a desperate propaganda campaign, feeding curated images of "festive" queues to international outlets while the streets of Dhaka and beyond remained eerily silent.

By claiming 59.4% turnout, they seek to signal to the US, the EU, and the UN that the "new Bangladesh" has the mandate of the people. But a mandate cannot be built on the exclusion of the opposition. When the Chief Adviser declares this the "birthday of a new Bangladesh," he is actually presiding over the funeral of pluralism.

The exclusion of the Awami League was not a legal necessity; it was a political hit. This was an "engineered" outcome designed to replace one dominant force with another, all while Yunus plays the role of the benevolent philosopher-king.

When a major political force is barred, the remaining contest becomes a farce. The supporters of the Awami League did not merely "stay away"; they were systematically erased from the democratic process.

This exclusion creates a dangerous precedent. ## **The International Community's Blind Spot**

The most tragic element of this engineered election is the silence, or worse, the complicity, of international observers. Even when they visited polling centers in Dhaka, there were no signs of voters - Kalerkantha (News Outlate) reported.

Peace is easy to maintain in a cemetery. The lack of violence on election day was not a sign of democratic health; it was a symptom of a non-contest. There is no need for ballot-snatching when the opposition isn't on the ballot. There is no need for voter intimidation when the voters have already been told their preferred candidates are "terrorists" or "fugitives." By accepting the 59% turnout figure at face value, international bodies are rewarding Yunus for his ability to stage-manage a crisis. They are ignoring the 90% of the country that looked at the February 12 polls and saw nothing but a fraudulent exercise in vanity.

## **The Suffering of the Ordinary Citizen**

Beyond the high-stakes political theater lies the grim reality of the Bangladeshi people. The Yunus administration's obsession with "reforming" the state has come at the cost of governing it. While the Chief Adviser focuses on his international image, the domestic economy is in shambles. Democracy is the safety valve of a nation. By sealing that valve through an engineered election, Yunus is inviting a future explosion. When people feel they cannot change their government through the ballot box, because the ballot box is a prop in a play, they eventually seek change through other, more volatile means.

Yunus is deliberately keeping the people of Bangladesh away from the very democracy he once championed. He has exchanged his Nobel-winning empathy for the cold, hard tools of political engineering. If the world continues to believe the fiction of 59% turnout, it will be complicit in the slow-motion collapse of a nation of 170 million people.

## **A Legacy of Deception**

The February 12 election will be remembered not as a "historic test," but as a historic heist. Muhammad Yunus has successfully orchestrated a transition that looks like a democracy on a spreadsheet but feels like a dictatorship on the street.

The international media must look past the "Gen Z" branding and the academic jargon of the "July Charter." They must ask the hard questions:

- Where were the 40 million Awami League voters?
- Why were polling stations in the heart of Dhaka empty for hours while the EC reported record numbers?
- How can a "referendum" yield 244% turnout in rural districts without being flagged as fraud?

The mask of the "interim" government has fallen. Underneath is a regime that fears the people it claims to serve. Muhammad Yunus may have convinced the world of his "success," but the empty polling booths of Bangladesh tell a much darker, much more honest story. The people of Bangladesh deserved a choice; instead, they were given a spectacle. And for that, they will suffer for years to come.




