


The Death of Democracy in Dhaka

Muhammad Yunus and the Farce of February 12 Election



The international community often views Nobel laureates through a lens of deified reverence, assuming that a Peace Prize in the pocket equates to a democrat in the soul. But in Bangladesh, that illusion has shattered. On February 12, 2026, the world witnessed not a "democratic reset," but a meticulously choreographed execution of the very concept of popular will. Under the cold, academic stewardship of Muhammad Yunus, Bangladesh has exchanged a flawed democracy for a sanitized autocracy, draped in the robes of "reform" and enforced by the threat of the mob.

While the Yunus-controlled Election Commission boasts of a "peaceful" vote, the reality is far more sinister. This was an election of the few, by the few, and for the few, a procedural sham that disenfranchised a third of the electorate to install a government that had already been hand-picked in the backrooms of the "interim" administration.

The Exclusionary Trap: A One-Sided "Mandate"

The most glaring indictment of February 12 is the forced absence of the Awami League (AL). By administratively banning the nation's historically largest political organization and keeping its leadership in exile or behind bars, the Yunus administration didn't just tip the scales; it burned the scale to the ground.

Imagine an election in the United Kingdom where the Labour Party is banned, or an American vote where the Republicans are barred from the ballot. The global outcry would be deafening. Yet, in Dhaka, Yunus has managed to sell this exclusion as "civilizational progress."

The data tells the true story of this democratic vacuum. While the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) claims a "sweeping victory," securing 212 of 300 seats, they were effectively running against ghosts and hand-picked "allies" like the student-led National Citizen Party (NCP). For the millions of traditional secular voters, the choice was simple: stay home or endorse a regime that has spent 18 months dismantling the country's secular fabric. This was not an election; it was a coronation in an empty room.

The "Micro-Manager" of Macro-Failure

While the interim government spent its energy on political engineering and "cleansing" state institutions of dissent, the backbone of the nation, its economy, was left to rot. For fifteen years, Bangladesh was the "Rising Tiger" of South Asia, with GDP growth peaking at 8%. Under the Yunus administration, that tiger has been declawed and starved.

The economic numbers are a stinging rebuke to the "microcredit pioneer":



👉 *The Growth Collapse: The Asian Development Bank (ADB) and IMF slashed growth forecasts to a dismal 3.9% for 2025. The "Rising Tiger" is now a limping kitten.*



👉 *Inflation as a Tax on the Poor: General inflation soared to 10.2% in 2025, with food prices hitting decade highs. Under Yunus, the average Bangladeshi saw their purchasing power evaporate while the administration focused on constitutional semantics.*



👉 *Data Integrity Crisis: In January 2026, the IMF gave Bangladesh's GDP statistics a 'C' rating, the second-lowest grade, highlighting a "touted development narrative" that lacks transparency and adequacy.*



👉 *The Jobless Uprising: Despite the "Gen Z" branding of the revolution, graduate unemployment remains at a staggering 13.5%, with over 84% of the labor force trapped in precarious, informal work.*

The "poverty-alleviation" expert has presided over a period where the cost of living reached its highest point in a decade, and the radical reduction of the Annual Development Programme (from Taka 230,000 crore to 200,000 crore) signaled a government in retreat from its own people.



The Referendum of Smoke and Mirrors

Alongside the parliamentary vote, Yunus pushed through a referendum on his "July Charter," an 84-point overhaul of the nation's core. But how can a citizen genuinely vote for "judicial independence" in a country where the courts are currently used as tools for political purges?

The reported 60.26% turnout for the referendum invites deep skepticism. In a climate of fear where student-led paramilitary wings like the National Citizen Party (NCP) "monitored" polling stations, the act of voting became an act of coercion rather than conviction.

The statistical anomalies of the day are mathematically impossible. According to official figures, between 11:00 AM and 12:00 PM on election day, the turnout allegedly jumped from roughly 15% to nearly 33%. This implies that 22 million ballots were cast in a single hour, an average of 381,339 votes per minute across the country. To believe this, one must believe every polling center in Bangladesh processed a voter every five seconds, without pause, for sixty minutes. In reality, independent observers reported empty streets and ghost stations.

This was an industrial-scale manipulation of numbers, intended to provide a thin veneer of legitimacy to a charter the public never debated. By using guiding symbols on the ballot, like placing a "tick" next to the Yes box, Yunus didn't hold a referendum; he held a psychological operation.

The Verdict: A Soft Coup with a Nobel Face


The February 12 election was not a victory for democracy; it was a funeral for it. Muhammad Yunus may have been a darling of the West in the 1990s, but in 2026, he is the architect of a fractured, exclusionary, and economically stagnant state.

He has presided over an election without an opposition, an economy without growth, and a "reform" process without consensus. The international community must stop nodding politely at the Nobel laureate and start looking at the data. A government born of exclusion, maintained through political persecution, and validated by a one-sided ballot cannot claim legitimacy. Bangladesh hasn't been "liberated"; it has been hijacked.

Rajshahi-4: From 244% to 72%




Constituencies Under Scrutiny




Ballot Design Debate
