

INTEGRITY UNDER QUESTION

Corruption Allegations and the Future of Bangladesh's International Crimes Tribunal



Executive Summary

Serious allegations of corruption involving prosecutors and investigators at Bangladesh's International Crimes Tribunal (ICT-BD) have raised significant concerns regarding the credibility and integrity of its proceedings.

A recent investigative report by journalist David Bergman — based on joint investigations by Prothom Alo and Netra News — alleges that a former ICT prosecutor sought bribes in connection with a high-profile case.

These revelations add to earlier corruption allegations raised within the tribunal against former chief prosecutor Tajul Islam and prosecutor Gazi Monowar Hossain Tamim by fellow prosecutor BM Sultan Mahmud.

If substantiated, these allegations could undermine public confidence not only in ongoing trials but also in previous convictions handled by the tribunal.

Background

The investigation centres on former ICT prosecutor Saimum Reza Talukder.

According to the investigative report, Talukder allegedly told the family of detained Fazle Karim Chowdhury — a Member of Parliament from the Bangladesh Awami League — that money would be required to secure bail.

The report further alleges that Talukder told the family that they would also need to pay an ICT investigation officer and claimed that the officer had already received bribes from Muniria Jubo Tabligh, an Islamist group campaigning for Chowdhury's prosecution.

These claims raise serious questions regarding the integrity of both prosecutorial and investigative processes within the tribunal.

Why These Allegations Matter

The International Crimes Tribunal has handled numerous politically and historically significant cases.

If corruption exists among prosecutors or investigators, it could potentially affect:

- Ongoing trials
- Previously concluded cases
- Public trust in the judiciary
- International perceptions of Bangladesh's justice system

The credibility of any legal institution depends not only on its legal authority but also on the integrity and transparency of its procedures.

Key Questions Raised

The allegations raise several critical questions:

- If prosecutors were allegedly willing to accept bribes for bail, could other prosecutorial decisions have been influenced by corruption?
- How credible can the investigative process be if investigators themselves may have accepted bribes?
- Can the integrity of tribunal proceedings remain intact if key actors responsible for investigation and prosecution are implicated in corruption?
- To what extent can previous convictions be relied upon if the integrity of the process itself is in doubt?

Recommended Government Actions

To safeguard the credibility and legitimacy of the justice process, the government should urgently consider the following measures:

1. Immediate Removal of Suspect Officials

All prosecutors and investigators against whom credible allegations have been raised should be removed from their positions pending investigation.

2. Suspension of Ongoing Proceedings

All trials currently underway before the tribunal should be temporarily suspended until corruption allegations are fully examined.

3. Halt Executions and Enforcement of Sentences

The government should halt the enforcement of sentences in cases where implicated prosecutors or investigators were involved.

4. Independent and Internationally Assisted Investigation

A comprehensive and independent investigation should be conducted, potentially with international legal assistance, to determine the scope and credibility of the allegations.

5. Review of Affected Convictions

If misconduct is confirmed, convictions linked to compromised officials should be reviewed to prevent miscarriages of justice.

Conclusion

A fundamental principle of justice remains clear:

Justice must not only be done — it must also be seen to be done.

Transparent investigations, accountability for wrongdoing, and institutional reforms are essential to restoring confidence in the justice processes of the International Crimes Tribunal Bangladesh.
